Sermon Discussion Questions

"USEFUL IN THE HANDS OF GOD"

Discuss

In the beginning of Acts, we learned that thousands in Jerusalem came to faith during the first months of the early church (see 2:41, 4:4, and 6:7). We are not told very much, however, about how any of those thousands came to believe. The eighth chapter of Acts starts with what appears at first glance to be a major disaster in the history of the early church: because of great persecution, all of the new Christians (except the apostles) are "scattered." But right away we see the fruit of that scattering. Philip, one of the seven chosen to serve the widows, travels to Samaria and proclaims the Gospel there. And at the end of the chapter, we are given the detailed account of how one person came to know Christ as his Savior. Philip was useful in the hands of God, and the result was that the Ethiopian eunuch joyfully discovered that he, too, was beloved by God.

- 1) The Samaritan woman who met Jesus at the well was surprised that Jesus, a Jew, would ask her for a drink, since Jews did not (as John simply states it) "associate with Samaritans." (Jn. 4:9)
 - What did Philip have to believe about Jesus and about the situation in which he found himself to preach the gospel to the Samaritans? Are there any groups of people that we see today in a way that is similar to the way Jews viewed Samaritans?
 - If we believe that everyone is within God's providence (i. e., that God can call any person to himself) and that God is sovereign over everything, what specific effects should that have on the way we evangelize and share the Gospel?
- 2) There is much in the story of Philip and the Ethiopian eunuch that is so unlike anything we encounter today: the chariot, a queen's treasurer reading from a scroll, Philip being suddenly carried away by the Spirit. Yet there is so much that we can learn from the way that Philip interacted with this man.
 - How can we share our faith the way that Philip did? Or, in other words, what might we find ourselves doing if we are humble, caring, and alert the way that Philip was?
- 3) The focus, over and over again in the book of Acts, is on Jesus. Philip, we are told, began with the passage in Isaiah and shared "the good news of Jesus." (v. 35)
 - Christians of almost every theological stripe say that we must make Jesus the center of our message to the world. What these various Christians say about Jesus can differ significantly, however. See, for example, this recent video about a "Jesus movement" called "Carry the Love" on U. S. college campuses: https://carrythelove.com/. What belief(s) does this video convey?
 - What specifically must we share about Jesus when we tell people the good news of the Gospel? (See Jn. 11:25-26 and Rom. 10:9-10.)
