All: For great is your love toward us; you have delivered us from the depths of the grave. You, O Lord, are a compassionate and gracious God, abounding in love and faithfulness.




* Prayer of adoration

All: Let us then approach the throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need.




