
* Call to worship Psalm 100

Leader: Shout for joy to the LORD, all the earth. Worship the LORD with gladness; come before him with joyful songs.


All: Know that the LORD is God. It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture.

* Prayer of adoration

Leader: What do the scriptures teach us about Jesus Christ?

All: That he, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to death—even death on a cross!

Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Call to confession 1 John 1:5-9

This is the message we have heard from him and declare to you: God is light; in him there is no darkness at all. If we claim to have fellowship with him yet walk in the darkness, we lie and do not live by the truth. But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, purifies us from all sin. If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness.

Assurance of God's pardoning grace

1 John 4:9-10, 15

This is how God showed his love among us: He sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him. This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins. If anyone acknowledges that Jesus is the Son of God, God lives in him and he in God.



* Scripture reading from Acts 13:42-52

⁴²As Paul and Barnabas were leaving the synagogue, the people invited them to speak further about these things on the next Sabbath. ⁴³When the congregation was dismissed, many of the Jews and devout converts to Judaism followed Paul and Barnabas, who talked with them and urged them to continue in the grace of God.

⁴⁴On the next Sabbath almost the whole city gathered to hear the word of the Lord. ⁴⁵When the Jews saw the crowds, they were filled with jealousy and talked abusively against what Paul was saying.

⁴⁶Then Paul and Barnabas answered them boldly: "We had to speak the word of God to you first. Since you reject it and do not consider yourselves worthy of eternal life, we now turn to the Gentiles. ⁴⁷For this is what the Lord has commanded us: 'I have made you a light for the Gentiles, that you may bring salvation to the ends of the earth.'"

⁴⁸When the Gentiles heard this, they were glad and honored the word of the Lord; and all who were appointed for eternal life believed. ⁴⁹The word of the Lord spread through the whole region.

⁵⁰But the Jews incited the God-fearing women of high standing and the leading men of the city. They stirred up persecution against Paul and Barnabas, and expelled them from their region. ⁵¹So they shook the dust from their feet in protest against them and went to Iconium. ⁵²And the disciples were filled with joy and with the Holy Spirit.

Prayer of preparation for the study of God's Word

Sermon "Responding to the Gospel: Lessons from 'Jewish Rejection and Gentile Joy'"*

Big Question: What will we do with God's Word and Gospel; gladly accept or sadly reject?

- 1. Gentile joy: the marks of glad acceptance that continues in grace (vv. 42-44, 48-49, 51-52)
 - the lessons learned from the glad acceptance of the Gentiles
 - ° continuing in the grace of God and honoring the Word of the Lord (vv. 42-43, 48)
 - the lessons learned from the glad acceptance of Paul and Barnabas
 - ° enduring boldness and resilient joy in the face of rejection and persecution (vv. 46-47, 51-52)
 - the ways in which our Lord works in glad acceptance
 - ° The Lord appoints unto eternal life and spreads his Word through the region. (vv. 48-49)
- 2. Jewish rejection: the marks of sad rejection of the grace in which we are to continue (vv. 45-47, 50)
 - Beware of the danger of progressive rejection that moves from the covertly internal to the overtly external! (vv. 45-47, 50)
