⁷But to each one of us grace has been given as Christ apportioned it. ⁸This is why it says:

"When he ascended on high, he led captives in his train and gave gifts to men."

⁹(What does "he ascended" mean except that he also descended to the lower, earthly regions? ¹⁰He who descended is the very one who ascended higher than all the heavens, in order to fill the whole universe.) ¹¹It was he who gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers, ¹²to prepare God's people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up ¹³until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ.

¹⁴Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of men in their deceitful scheming. ¹⁵Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will in all things grow up into him who is the Head, that is, Christ. ¹⁶From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.

Dr. Richard L. Pratt, Jr. is president and co-founder of Third Millennium Ministries, a ministry providing sound biblical and theological training for Christian leaders worldwide. Before dedicating himself full-time to Thirdmill, Dr. Pratt served as chair of the Old Testament department at Reformed Theological Seminary. Dr. Pratt studied at Westminster Theological Seminary, received his M.Div. from Union Theological Seminary, and earned his Th.D. in Old Testament Studies from Harvard University. He is the general editor of the NIV

Spirit of the Reformation Study Bible, a translator for the *New Living Translation*, and the author of numerous articles and books.
