to save or heal ourselves. Restore what sin has laid waste; our only


hope is in you. Amen.

Assurance of God's pardoning grace

Prayer of intercession and lament

Leader: Our Gracious Savior, the source of all forgiveness and healing, we come before you in lament over the devastation of abuse. This epidemic of evil is overwhelming and we don't know what to do, but our eyes are upon you. Hear the cries of the suffering, rebuke the sins of the perpetrators, forgive the apathy of the indifferent, and reveal to us our own complicity that we might repent. Shape us into a community that actively cares for and protects the vulnerable, and help us to cultivate an atmosphere of trust which allows the unspeakable to be brought to light.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: For the survivors of abuse that took place here, those who have come forward and those who remain silent, we pray that you will restore what sin has laid waste. May our church's confession and repentance be a balm to their suffering and hope in their darkness, and may they not hold the sins of this church against you. More than anything, may they discover the renewing grace of your Gospel, which is ultimately destined to heal every wound and wipe every tear.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: For the survivors of all forms of abuse, particularly those among us this day, we pray for them in their suffering. May they know, beyond a shadow of a doubt, that their suffering is not their fault, that their shame is a lie, and that your love is real. May they know, beyond a shadow of a doubt, that help is available and healing is possible. Give mercy to those who suffer and lead them to your cross and resurrection as their eternal comfort and steadfast hope.


All: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: For the perpetrators of sexual abuse and all forms of abuse, we pray for justice. May they be exposed and rebuked by the severe mercy of your providence, and may their brokenness yield true repentance and faith in you who alone can make the foulest clean.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: For the church of Jesus Christ, we pray for your grace and guidance to lead us. May our communities be known as the safest place for survivors and the most defended place from abusers, and may we apologize and repent where we have failed in this. In a world of sexual chaos, may we bear witness to your good and perfect design for human sexuality. May we be known as a counterculture to the insatiable lust and exploitation that we see and experience in this life.

All: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. Amen.



EMMA KATE MOONEY, SUPPORTED MISSIONARY IN CARDIFF

Please join us in praying for LMPC member, Emma Kate Mooney, as she prepares to return to Cardiff, Wales, to continue her service with Pioneers. Emma Kate was born and raised on Lookout Mountain. It was during her short-term missions trips to the Middle East in 2011 and 2013, and her time in Ankara, Turkey in 2014, that her eyes and heart were opened to asylum seekers and refugees fleeing neighboring countries. She has spent the last 18 months in Cardiff, Wales, serving on



a Pioneers team where she teaches English to women of all different nationalities, serves on the international student and families teams with her local church, and spends time with international women who are survivors of trauma. She is a trained Trauma Healing Facilitator through American Bible Society which will be her main focus in ministry this year. It is her deep desire to share the love of Christ as she seeks to build relationships with women of all the nations who are coming to Cardiff.

GRACE recommendation #17: GRACE recommends that LMPC review the resources on the LMPC campus to be sure that resources exist for families impacted by all forms of abuse. This should include books and links to appropriate counseling in which a licensed clinician is able to provide evidence-based therapy and, within that setting, to also address the spiritual impact of all forms of abuse and misconduct.

LMPC response: The Safeguarding Team will commend to our library specific resources for families impacted by all forms of abuse. We will notify the congregation of these resources and also include these recommended resources and links on our website.
