

¹Then Agrippa said to Paul, "You have permission to speak for yourself." So Paul motioned with his hand and began his defense: ²"King Agrippa, I consider myself fortunate to stand before you today as I make my defense against all the accusations of the Jews, ³and especially so because you are well acquainted with all the Jewish customs and controversies. Therefore, I beg you to listen to me patiently. ⁴The Jews all know the way I have lived ever since I was a child, from the beginning of my life in my own country, and also in Jerusalem. ⁵They have known me for a long time and can testify, if they are willing, that according to the strictest sect of our religion, I lived as a Pharisee.

⁶And now it is because of my hope in what God has promised our fathers that I am on trial today. ⁷This is the promise our twelve tribes are hoping to see fulfilled as they earnestly serve God day and night. O king, it is because of this hope that the Jews are accusing me. ⁸Why should any of you consider it incredible that God raises the dead?

9"I too was convinced that I ought to do all that was possible to oppose the name of Jesus of Nazareth. ¹⁰And that is just what I did in Jerusalem. On the authority of the chief priests I put many of the saints in prison, and when they were put to death, I cast my vote against them. ¹¹Many a time I went from one synagogue to another to have them punished, and I tried to force them to blaspheme. In my obsession against them, I even went to foreign cities to persecute them. ¹²On one of these journeys I was going to Damascus with the authority and commission of the chief priests. ¹³About noon, O king, as I was on the road, I saw a light from heaven, brighter than the sun, blazing around me and my companions. ¹⁴We all fell to the ground, and I heard a voice saying to me in Aramaic, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me? It is hard for you to kick against the goads.' 15Then I asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting,' the Lord replied. 16'Now get up and stand on your feet. I have appeared to you to appoint you as a servant and as a witness of what you have seen of me and what I will show you. 17I will rescue you from your own people and from the Gentiles. I am sending you to them ¹⁸to open their eyes and turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan to God, so that they may receive forgiveness of sins and a place among those who are sanctified by faith in me.' 19So then, King Agrippa, I was not disobedient to the vision from heaven. ²⁰First to those in Damascus, then to those in Jerusalem and in all Judea, and to the Gentiles also, I preached that they should repent and turn to God and prove their repentance by their deeds. ²¹That is why the Jews seized me in the temple courts and tried to kill me. ²²But I have had God's help to this very day, and so I stand here and testify to small and great alike. I am saying nothing beyond what the prophets and Moses said would happen—²³that the Christ would suffer and, as the first to rise from the dead, would proclaim light to his own people and to the Gentiles."

²⁴At this point Festus interrupted Paul's defense. "You are out of your mind, Paul!" he shouted. "Your great learning is driving you insane." ²⁵"I am not insane, most excellent Festus," Paul replied. "What I am saying is true and reasonable. ²⁶The king is familiar with these things, and I can speak freely to him. I am convinced that none of this has escaped his notice, because it was not done in a corner ²⁷King Agrippa, do you believe the prophets? I know you do." ²⁸Then Agrippa said to Paul, "Do you think that in such a short time you can persuade me to be a Christian?" ²⁹Paul replied, "Short time or long—I pray God that not only you but all who are listening to me today may become what

I am, except for these chains." ³⁰The king rose, and with him the governor and Bernice and those sitting with them. ³¹They left the room, and while talking with one another, they said, "This man is not doing anything that deserves death or imprisonment." ³²Agrippa said to Festus, "This man could have been set free if he had not appealed to Caesar."




"Embodying and Expressing the Gospel Message" Joe Novenson, pastor of senior adults


Like Paul, we live to embody and express the Gospel message that:

LENT

Churches in the Reformed tradition like our own do not have a long history of promoting the practice of Lent, the 40-day period before the celebration of Easter. In recent years, however, many evangelical Christians have begun observing Lent in some form or fashion, sometimes adopting the tradition of giving up something like chocolate or coffee. We believe that it is important to remember that the practice of Lent was not established by Christ or the apostles, and scholars have pointed out with growing frequency that a 40-day Lent was not the common practice of the church in its first 300 years. We also think it is extremely important for any of us who choose to observe Lent in some way to understand that we never fast, repent, or abstain from something we love in order to earn anything from God. Because of Jesus' death and resurrection, believers are already partakers of Christ and all his benefits. We have already received a kingdom that cannot be shaken. (Heb. 12:28)

Lent is neither an obligation nor a duty, but we recognize that it can be helpful to thoughtfully engage in a period of waiting and watching in the days leading up to Easter. We have chosen to put certain visual reminders of Lent in place in both of our worship locations. The sparse floral décor can help us remember the example of our Savior, who made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross. (Phil. 2:9) The pulpit cloth in the sanctuary is changed to kingly purple, reminding us of the reign of Christ our King. As we move towards Easter, we do well to spend more time savoring the goodness of God and the depth of his love for us.

WORLD MISSIONS MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT: TRINITY CHURCH MANCHESTER

Trinity Church Manchester was planted into the north of Manchester in June 2020. It was planted by our supported church plant City Church Manchester. The church began with 23 adults and 8 children and has grown already despite the significant restrictions in England during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Manchester as a whole is strongly secular, with less than 3% of people attending any church. The north of the city is particularly under-served by evangelical churches, and Trinity Church was planted to be a hub church for the communities around it. The vision of the church is to be a Gospel community for north Manchester that gives, grows, and partners for God's glory.

- Give thanks that their membership continues to grow and stabilize during the Covid-19 pandemic.
- Pray for the provision of a space to meet. They are meeting online, but this has become more challenging as the months go by.
