- 1. He begins his ministry with a foundation of divine sonship. (vv. 21-22)
 - Identification with sinners as the Son (v. 21)
 - Consecration unto service by the Spirit (v. 22)
 - Attestation of being pleasing to God by the Father (v. 22)
- 2. He begins his ministry with a foundation of human sonship. (vv. 23-38)
 - He is Mary and Joseph's son. (vv. 23-36)
 - He is the "second Adam." (v. 37)
 - He is our substitute, the perfect God/man Savior. (v. 38)
