MEET OUR MISSIONARY GUESTS

DR. AILA TASSE FOUNDER AND PRESIDENT OF LIFEWAY MISSION INTERNATIONAL (LMI) LIFEWAYMI.ORG

Dr. Tasse was born in Northern Kenya into one of the country's 26 unreached people groups. After receiving a vision from God of cabbage growing in the Diid Galgalu Desert, a place where nothing grows, he began LMI as a response to this vision. "Of course, God didn't mean cabbages; he meant the people groups," he says. He began traveling to various villages and nomadic people groups to preach the Word of God. He realized the need to raise up indigenous leaders among the various tribes to continue to share about Jesus. From this, the idea of a "church on the back of a camel" was born.

Because LMI is indigenously led, they understand that the needs of the people are not only spiritual. Someone who is hungry cannot fully grasp the Gospel; therefore, LMI seeks to meet the needs of the whole person through the "four wheels" of LMI (see lifewaymi.org). Two decades later, LMI is now engaging with all 26 unreached people groups in Kenya and operating in 10 countries. LMI leaders regularly train people from all over Africa, as well as other regions that are hostile to the Gospel, in methods to successfully reach the unreached.

DR. ANANY G. PROSPER COUNTRY DIRECTOR FOR THE CHILDREN'S NUTRITION PROGRAM OF HAITI (CNP OF HAITI) CNPHAITI.ORG

Dr. Prosper is a native Haitian with more than a decade of experience as executive director or chief of mission with health networks in developing countries. He is an international expert on healthcare systems and health policy, and offers over 15 years of experience building comprehensive, community-based healthcare systems across five countries, with a focus on integrated women's health, health promotion, and equity.

Dr. Prosper was born and raised in Haiti, where he was affected by deep-seated economic inequality and political turmoil. As a Christian organization, CNP of Haiti's mission is to help raise a generation of healthy children who can then raise Haiti from poverty. He brings all of himself to every initiative, working diligently and patiently to earn and keep a community's trust. His goal is to provide strategic leadership to produce long-term positive health outcomes that will contribute to steady economic development, social progress, harmony, and political stability.
