Luke 5:17-26

¹⁷On one of those days, as he was teaching, Pharisees and teachers of the law were sitting there, who had come from every village of Galilee and Judea and from Jerusalem. And the power of the Lord was with him to heal. ¹⁸And behold, some men were bringing on a bed a man who was paralyzed, and they were seeking to bring him in and lay him before Jesus, ¹⁹but finding no way to bring him in, because of the crowd, they went up on the roof and let him down with his bed through the tiles into the midst before Jesus.

²⁰And when he saw their faith, he said, "Man, your sins are forgiven you." ²¹And the scribes and the Pharisees began to question, saying, "Who is this who speaks blasphemies? 2021 YEAR-END GIVING REPORT

Praise God for his abundant provision through his people at LMPC. While giving of \$5.1 million was under budget by approximately \$128,000, we had more than adequate funds to meet the operational and ministry needs of the church in 2021. Giving in 2021 was approximately 1.7% above 2020 and giving to LMPC-supported missionaries and ministries was approximately \$1.7 million. Thank you for your generous gifts toward the work of the Kingdom at LMPC.
