“Crates for Ukraine” is a Mission to the World ministry providing personal and humanitarian aid from the hands of churches in the U.S. to the hands of churches and displaced communities in Ukraine.

Beginning today, you can sign up to donate essential supplies which will be packed and delivered by courier to Krakow, Poland, where the materials can then be distributed. There are three types of crates being assembled, including basic care, basic meds, and basic wound care. Choose which item(s) you would like to donate and sign up at lmpc.org or by using the QR code. Our goal is to send at least two couriers (members of LMPC) with at least nine crates of supplies, so we need churchwide participation!

Your donated items can be dropped off in the Reception Room on Wednesday, July 20 from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. or on Sunday, July 31 from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. or from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m.

⁹“At that time I said to you, ‘I am not able to bear you by myself. ¹⁰The LORD your God has multiplied you, and behold, you are today as numerous as the stars of heaven. ¹¹May the LORD, the God of your fathers, make you a thousand times as many as you are and bless you, as he has promised you! ¹²How can I bear by myself the weight and burden of you and your strife? ¹³Choose for your tribes wise, understanding, and experienced men, and I will appoint them as your heads.’ ¹⁴And you answered me, ‘The thing that you have spoken is good for us to do.’

¹⁵“So I took the heads of your tribes, wise and experienced men, and set them as heads over you, commanders of thousands, commanders of hundreds, commanders of fifties, commanders of tens, and officers, throughout your tribes. ¹⁶And I charged your judges at that time, ‘Hear the cases between your brothers, and judge righteously between a man and his brother or the alien who is with him. ¹⁷You shall not be partial in judgment. You shall hear the small and the great alike. You shall not be intimidated by anyone, for the judgment is God’s. And the case that is too hard for you, you shall bring to me, and I will hear it.’ ¹⁸And I commanded you at that time all the things that you should do.”
