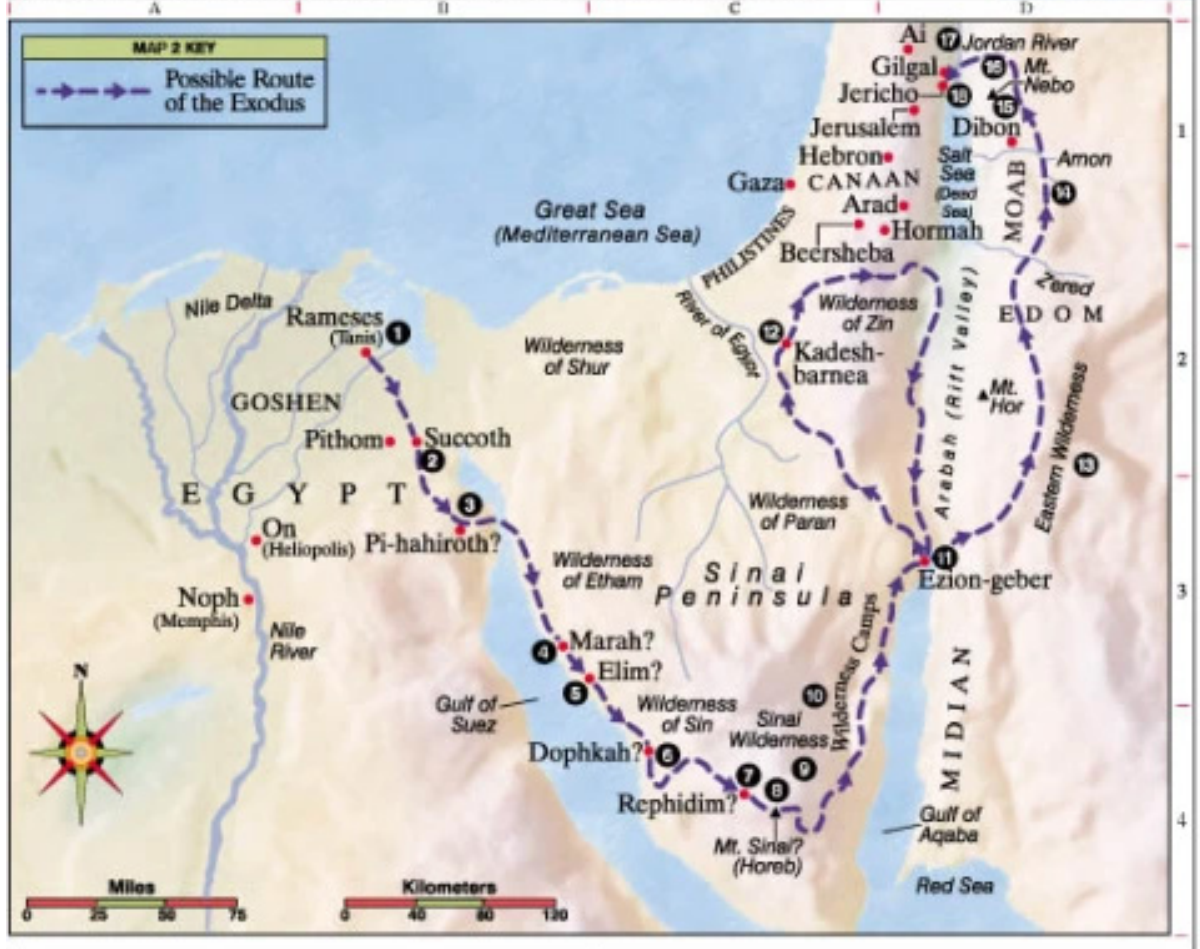

Deuteronomy 2:1-23

¹“Then we turned and journeyed into the wilderness in the direction of the Red Sea, as the LORD told me. And for many days we traveled around Mount Seir. ²Then the LORD said to me, ³“You have been traveling around this mountain country long enough. Turn northward ⁴and command the people, “You are about to pass through the territory of your brothers, the people of Esau, who live in Seir; and they will be afraid of you. So be very careful. ⁵Do not contend with them, for I will not give you any of their land, no, not so much as for the sole of the foot to tread on, because I have given Mount Seir to Esau as a possession. ⁶You shall purchase food from them with money, that you may eat, and you shall also buy water of them with money, that you may drink. ⁷For the LORD your God has blessed you in all the work of your hands. He knows your going through this great wilderness. These forty years the LORD your God has been with you. You have lacked nothing.”’ ⁸So we went on, away from our brothers, the people of Esau, who live in Seir, away from the Arabah road from Elath and Ezion-geber.

“And we turned and went in the direction of the wilderness of Moab. ⁹And the LORD said to me, ‘Do not harass Moab or contend with them in battle, for I will not give you any of their land for a possession, because I have given Ar to the people of Lot for a possession.’ ¹⁰(The Emim formerly lived there, a people great and many, and tall as the Anakim. ¹¹Like the Anakim they are also counted as Rephaim, but the Moabites call them Emim. ¹²The Horites also lived in Seir formerly, but the people of Esau dispossessed them and destroyed them from before them and settled in their place, as Israel did to the land of their possession, which the LORD gave to them.) ¹³‘Now rise up and go over the brook Zered.’ So we went over the brook Zered. ¹⁴And the time from our leaving Kadesh-barnea until we crossed the brook Zered was thirty-eight years, until the entire generation, that is, the men of war, had perished from the camp, as the LORD had sworn to them. ¹⁵For indeed the hand of the LORD was against them, to destroy them from the camp, until they had perished.

¹⁶“So as soon as all the men of war had perished and were dead from among the people, ¹⁷the LORD said to me, ¹⁸“Today you are to cross the border of Moab at Ar. ¹⁹And when you approach the territory of the people of Ammon, do not harass them or contend with them, for I will not give you any of the land of the people of Ammon as a possession, because I have given it to the sons of Lot for a possession.’ ²⁰(It is also counted as a land of Rephaim. Rephaim formerly lived there—but the Ammonites call them Zamzummim— ²¹a people great and many, and tall as the Anakim; but the LORD destroyed them before the Ammonites, and they dispossessed them and settled in their place, ²²as he did for the people of Esau, who live in Seir, when he destroyed the Horites before them and they dispossessed them and settled in their place even to this day. ²³As for the Avvim, who lived in villages as far as Gaza, the Caphtorim, who came from Caphtor, destroyed them and settled in their place.)”

SERMON NOTES

“Trusting God No Matter What”

Deuteronomy 2:1-23

1. God’s commands are to be heeded, even when we don’t understand. (vv. 1-4)
2. God’s generous provision is perfect, despite how it may appear to us. (v. 7)
3. God’s gracious promises are sure, no matter how much time passes. (vv. 5, 9, 19)

MISSIONARY GUESTS TONIGHT

David and Eowyn Stoddard, serving with Mission to the World

David, son of a PCA church-planter, was raised in Louisiana and Tennessee. At King College in Tennessee, he majored in political science and modern foreign languages, earned a Master of Divinity from Westminster Theological Seminary in California, and a Master of Theology from WTS in Philadelphia.

Eowyn is the daughter of MTW missionaries who served in France. She majored in German language and literature at Wellesley College and obtained a master's degree in Biblical Studies from Westminster Theological Seminary, where she also met David. They have five children: Jesse, Liam, Alethea, Emma, and Ethan.

David serves as the International Director for Europe, overseeing MTW's vision, values, and personnel in Europe. Eowyn assists David in his role and supports church planting through evangelism, teaching, and outreach to refugees. David and Eowyn joined MTW's church planting movement in eastern Berlin in 2001. Over the past 20 years, Team Berlin has been involved in planting five churches and a campus of Martin Bucer Seminary.

Paul, serving with Bible Mission Global

Paul was born in Almaty, Kazakhstan, to a large Christian family of German background. Paul's father was a deacon of the Evangelical Christian Baptist Church. Although the communistic government prohibited teaching children about God, he heard Bible stories and learned how to pray early in his childhood.

From 1993 to 1997, Paul served as the Director of the Bible Mission Regional Ministry Center in Almaty, Kazakhstan. He then moved to Germany and continued serving at the Bible Mission headquarters in Germany. In 2007, Paul began serving as the Field Director of Bible Mission Global.

Paul will be joined by **Gerhard**, the Director of Communications for Bible Mission Global.

Gerhard was born in Kazakhstan in 1989, into a family of German background and nationality. Having grown up in Germany with a touch of Asian culture contributed to the formation of a multicultural mindset.

After one year of ministry in Kazakhstan and three years of Bible studies in Switzerland, Gerhard was invited to join Bible Mission Germany in 2014.

As the Director of Communications, Gerhard has the task of sharing with supporters and those who pray what God is doing on the mission field and inviting churches and individuals to become part of God's work by participating in the ministry – all for God's glory.
