Affirmation of the law: the third commandment

Leader: What is the third commandment?

All: The third commandment is: You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God, for the Lord will not hold anyone guiltless who misuses his name.

Leader: What does the third commandment require?

All: The third commandment requires the holy and reverent use of God's names, titles, qualities, regulations, Word, and works.

Leader: What does the third commandment forbid?

All: The third commandment forbids our treating as unholy or abusing anything God uses to make himself known.

Leader: What is the reason for the third commandment?

All: The reason for the third commandment is that the Lord our God will not allow those who break this commandment to escape his righteous judgment, although they may escape punishment from men.

Westminster Shorter Catechism, questions 53-56

Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like a man who looks at his face in a mirror and, after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like. But the man who looks intently into the perfect law that gives freedom, and continues to do this, not forgetting what he has heard, but doing it—he will be blessed in what he does. If anyone considers himself religious and yet does not keep a tight rein on his tongue, he deceives himself and his religion is worthless.

 - Swearing by God's name in an oath only to lie in testimony and vows

 - Exploiting God's name for our own self-advancement and gain

 - Worshipping in God's name casually and flippantly
