#### Affirmation of the law: the seventh commandment

Leader: What does the seventh commandment teach us?

All: That God condemns all unchastity, and that, therefore, we should thoroughly detest it and live decent and chaste lives, within or outside of the holy state of marriage.

Leader: Does God, in this commandment, forbid only such scandalous sins as adultery?

All: We are temples of the Holy Spirit, body and soul, and God wants both to be kept clean and holy. That is why God forbids all unchaste actions, looks, talk, thoughts, or desires, and whatever may incite someone to them.

Call to confession Romans 3:23-24

All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified freely by his grace through the redemption that came by Christ Jesus.

## Prayer of confession

Leader: Father, God in heaven, you have told us: "blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." Your own love for us demonstrates sacrifice for the sake of others, yet we long to please ourselves at the cost of others. We constantly look for fulfillment through physical and emotional gratification rather than in our God, the Creator.

All: Forgive us for treating human beings as objects to be used rather than people to be loved. Forgive us for indulging unholy desires and secret habits, and for the lies we tell to cover our actions.

Leader: We immerse our thoughts, our eyes, and our bodies in the lies of this

world. Forgive us for allowing your good gift of sex to become an

idol that consumes us.

All: Give us renewed hearts that long to bring healing to what is

sexually twisted and broken in this world. Give us fresh eyes that look to Jesus as the image of the invisible God. Flood our desires with the joy of your Son Jesus, so that we might rightly enjoy

every good and perfect gift that you give.
