Affirmation of the law: the tenth commandment

Leader: What does the tenth commandment require of us?

- All: That not even the slightest thought or desire contrary to any of God's commandments should ever arise in our heart. Rather, with all our heart we should always hate all sin and delight in all righteousness.
- Leader: But can those converted to God obey these commandments perfectly?
- All: No. In this life even the holiest have only a small beginning of this obedience. Nevertheless, with all seriousness of purpose, they do begin to live according to all, not only some, of God's commandments.
- Leader: No one in this life can obey the ten commandments perfectly: why then does God want them preached so pointedly?
- All: First, so that the longer we live the more we may come to know our sinfulness and the more eagerly look to Christ for forgiveness of sins and righteousness. Second, so that, while praying to God for the grace of the Holy Spirit, we may never stop striving to be renewed more and more after God's image, until after this life we reach our goal: perfection.

Call to confession

- Leader: Father God, every good and perfect gift comes from you, and you have graciously poured out more than we could possibly imagine.
- All: Yet, despite your lavish generosity, we long for more. Forgive us for filling our minds with the things that we don't have instead of gratefully and contentedly living in the grace of what we have been given.
- Leader: We delude ourselves into believing that one more item, one more experience, or one more person will bring peace and contentment.
- All: Forgive us for seeking ultimate satisfaction in circumstances, possessions, and relationships. Restore to us the joy of your salvation, and enable us, by your Spirit, to rest in what you have done for us in Jesus Christ.

Assurance of God's pardoning grace

Since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. And we rejoice in the hope of the glory of God.

You see, at just the right time, when we were still powerless, Christ died for the ungodly. Very rarely will anyone die for a righteous man, though for a good man someone might possibly dare to die. But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

SERMON NOTES

"Do Not Covet" Deuteronomy 5:21

- 1. The intention of the commandment
 - God is building a community of people who delight in him and trust in his provision.
- 2. The meaning of the commandment
 - Negatively: We are to depart from discontentment, envying, and begrudging what God has given to our neighbors.
 - Positively: We are to direct our hearts toward God with gratitude and desire what is best for our neighbor.
- 3. The hope for forgiveness and formation
 - Forgiveness is found in the One who had everything and gave it up for us. (Philippians 2)
 - Formation comes as we pursue contentment, knowing that we can lose anything because in Jesus we already have everything. (Philippians 4:11-13; 1 Timothy 6:6-10)
