
¹⁷For Christ did not send me to baptize but to preach the gospel, and not with words of eloquent wisdom, lest the cross of Christ be emptied of its power. ¹⁸For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." ²⁰Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? ²¹For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe. ²²For Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, ²³but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, ²⁴but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. ²⁵For the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men.

SERMON NOTES

"Christ Crucified: The Power and Wisdom of God" 1 Corinthians 1:17-25

- 1. What the world pursues: eloquent wisdom and miraculous signs (vv. 17-22)
 - Those who are perishing live according to the standards of human wisdom and therefore wrongly view the cross as foolishness.

- 2. What the church has to proclaim: God sovereignly calls sinners to faith in Christ crucified. (vv. 21-25)
 - Those who are being saved live according to the standard of God's wisdom and therefore rightly view the cross as the power and wisdom of God.

HOLY WEEK SERIES: DEATH IS SWALLOWED UP IN VICTORY

In 1 Corinthians, the Apostle Paul makes clear that the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus Christ are the heart of the Christian faith. "Foolish" though it seems to the world (1:18, 21, 23), the message of the cross and the empty tomb is the power of God for salvation (1:18, 24). It shows us what love is (Chapter 13), and it gives Christians a picture of our glorious future, when death will not have the final word (15:55). Join us for Holy Week at LMPC as we explore 1 Corinthians and consider again the victory we have through our crucified and risen savior, the Lord Jesus Christ (15:57).
