#### WORLD MISSIONS COMMITTEE UPDATE: JUBA

Join your World Missions Committee in praying for the people of Juba, South Sudan. South Sudan has struggled for years with conflicts that have weakened its institutions, causing many other problems such as economic crises, corruption, and nepotism. Fighting, which broke out in April 2023, is a great threat, as it will worsen the economy and security of the country. Thousands of Sudanese and South Sudanese are fleeing the war, entering Juba. The population is increasing rapidly, causing demand to exceed supply. The threat of a famine is looming. The World Missions Committee recently approved a gift of \$10,000 to assist with relief efforts. Not only will these funds assist with the purchase and distribution of food supplies, but through our partnering agency, Bibles will be provided so more than 300 households will see the goodness of God and hear the Gospel, to strengthen their faith and remain hopeful.
